on the ocean floor.










One day, a rain storm made the ocean waves very large.

Rockie and her family showed me that plastic bottles, soda cans, cardboard and dry paper should all go in the BLUE Recycle Can.




# But, trash like Styrofoam, straws, potato chip bags must go into the BLACK Trash Can because they cannot be recycled.




## I liked cleaning up Ballona Creek with my new friends, but I missed my family.

As I was sorting the recyclables, the water in the creek started to rise higher and higher.




### The water began to flow faster and faster.

The water tossed me around and around as I kept swimming and swimming.








When it was all over, I found myself back at home with my family and friends.


### I told them about the raccoon family.

My family and friends wanted to learn how to clean up the reef where we lived.






I showed them how to recycle the materials we found on the ocean floor.
